## CURRENT TOPICS.

The village of Hammonton, on the Camden & Atlantic Railway, New Jersey, is greatly excited over the discovery of the bodies of twenty-one children, buried in a small plot of ground attached to the Santuary, called the Wivion Home, under the supervision of Miss S. S. Wivion, a middle-aged woman. That the bodies of the children died from natural causes, is disputed by neglect by Miss Wivion, of improper sanitary arrangements, and the gross incompetency of nurses.

A SPECIAL from Clarksville, Tenn., reports the discovery of a band of outlaws who have been depredating for fifteen years in Montgomery county. The chief was Ransom Morrow, a prominent farmer, 60 years old, living fifteen miles from town, "two of the gang" were his sons, and the two made gang and robbery their business. ### STATE ITEMS.

A blast exploded at the Champion mine, Marquette, on the 1st of May, killing 12 men and Paul Taaffe. The former leaves a widow.
