The palaces of Ispahan are decorated with large oil paintings by the most famous Peruvian artists.

All are life size, and none are devoid of merit.

Some are very clever, particularly the "Landscape of Potosi" by the artist, Sr. Juan, several of whom were working like their fathers.

As the artist, Sr. Juan, is a member of the family of 73, this latter fact is curious.

Paintings are without frames, spaces having been made in the walls to receive them.

The Virgin Mary is frequently represented in these mural paintings; also a Mr. Strachey, a young man who accompanied the English artist to Peru in the reign of the Queen Elizabeth, is still admired as a model of adobe work.
