TIMELY TOPICS.

There were better opportunities for men to get such a livelihood in such a country as this, where all men are civilly equal, there should be no such thing as a man's 'two classes'. There should not be one class organized as a laboring class and another as an employing class. Education and a knowledge and respect of the law should be spread among the people. The hangings will be rich and of a color palette to contrast with the woodwork and decorating, folding bed seats, hand cases, etc. will be of the highest quality. The other rooms will contain the most standard of appointments. The car, which will be one of the finest ever turned out of the shops, will cost \$35,000.
