ATTENTION SCHOOL TEACHERS. Board of School Examiners for Oakland County.

Examinations of teachers during the remainder of the year 1888 will be held at the court house, Pontiac, on the following dates: September 28, 29, 30, October 26 and 27, November 20 and December 1.

These examinations will be devoted to the third grade work and applicants will be examined in the following branches: Reading, penmanship, geography, grammar, written and mental arithmetic, theory and art of teaching.

Third grade certificates will be granted only to those applicants who, in the opinion of the board, shall possess the ability to teach and govern a school, and who shall average at least eighty-five per cent in all the branches required for third grade.

Candidates will be granted only to applicants of good moral character. Applicants who are strangers to the board must furnish satisfactory references to their moral character.

Both written and oral work will be required at the examinations. The secretary will not issue a special order in any case unless authorized by the board.
