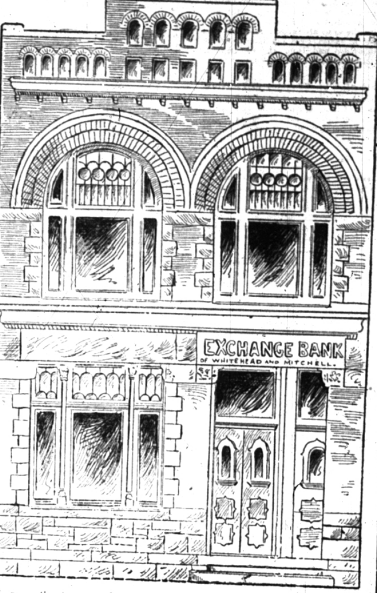
HOME NOTES. A wedding in town Sunday last. Big Beaver and Royal Oak crowded out.
