"The man is the son of J. H. Whitney, superintendent of the Bellford Paper mill at Kalamazoo, and the woman is the daughter of a man who has run a house in the city for several years. Young Whitney is a graduate of the college and was in Galesburg learning where he was going. The woman had recently reformed. It is said and was believed she had been living with her father. There are no signs for the double deed."
