It is estimated that 3,000 to 4,000 cords of pulp wood a day enter into the manufacture of paper in the United States. At the minimum 3,000 cords, the total for a year would be the enormous amount of 900,000 cords.

It is reported that a man has patented an X-ray machine for examining jewels, consisting of means for producing the rays, a support for the jewel operator, and a single optical mechanism to alternately draw them in, the supporting table being raised and lowered at the foot while the operation is going on.

Compressed air is used in place of the old-fashioned wheel sweep to raise water from the well, the bucket being hung on one end of a rope with a hollow air chamber and a number of pumps inside the opposite end.
