ELECTION NEWS.

Mitchell With All of His Party Return to Private Life.

A Big Vote Pooled in Bloomfield, Giving Mitchell 87 Votes Over His Opponent, Against a Republican Majority of 170, Showing Mitchell 257 Ahead of His Ticket.

A Republican day was Tuesday last for nearly all day. A slight drizzle along in the afternoon proved democratic tears were enough for the better republican ticket was elected throughout by majorities ranging from 300 to 1180.

From estimates received at this hour, Pigeon carries Oakland county by 700 to 1000 majority. Whiting made a great run in Pontiac, carrying it about 100 majority. The farmers in the country have all turned for Progress, carrying the majority of the ticket with them and defeating the democratic candidates. Sam Smith, republican candidate for congressman, will carry the county by 1100 majority. For state representative and senator, Hammond and Davis, republican candidates, will be elected by 300 majority. Belt, republican candidate for sheriff, will carry the majority 500 majority. Balance of county ticket running ahead except for surveyor, Russell getting about 300 majority.
