HIS MAJORITY OVER 40,000.

There were about 40 men employed in the structure, when, without an instant warning, the entire roof fell in a mass of splintered timbers, floor and an immense amount of scaffolding and temporary work down to the lower floor.

The noise of the falling, crushing, grinding mass was followed by the sound of falling timbers and debris. The fire department and hospital ambulances were on the scene in a very short time and even then the work of rescuing the victims was a very dangerous and difficult task.
