"Life on the Ocean Wave" - on Board the Steamer Cleveland.

On board Steamer Cleveland in Strait between Vancouver Island and B. C., Mainland. DEAR SISTER:—I am in excellent health

ly trip thius far. No rough weather at all. It rained jesterday p. m., is cooler this a. m., but not cold. The weather has been very warm and pleasant since wheth the seen very warm and pleasant since wheth thome. Our boys are all well and eajoying themselves, no sickness of any account a babard, among about 194 Klondikers. We have about 10 dogs aboard. If ed sorry for the poor things, they are chained in crates on the upper dock. The second of t siderably colder last night, the

lower decks and hall: In sternend or lower deck are fitted up some state, rooms and a dining room, especially for ladies, and for men who fare fortunate enough to have a lady with him. Next is our dining room, about 30 feet long. The farniture is a swing table at one side, 20 or 25 feet long by about two feet wide, the proper height from the floor. Chairs are simply a place to stand, and the table furniture consists of tin and iron. You ought to see the rush and push for meals, which, by the way, are very good, plenty, consisting of berefsteak, rosat beef, boiled beef and stew, pork chops, salmon and trout, cabbage, home-made bread with plenty of good butter, Johnny cake and sometimes pic and sweet cake, good Irish potatoes with jackets on, with bread or consordations of the potatoes with jackets on, with bread or ice puddings for dinner and rolled oats

potatoes with jackets on, with bread or rice puddings for dinner and rolled oats for breakfast. There is plenty of food and they are very liberal with it.

Then comes our sleeping apartment, which I wish you could see, and which I will try to describe. It occupies all of the remaining part of the deck, except what is taken up by two or three gangways, engine room, wash stands, water barrels, etc. The bunks, and they are bunks indeed, are temporary affairs. They are double, three deep up the outsides and down the centre, of sufficient number to accommodate about 225 passengers. The beds are of canvas, stretched on poles, we furnishing our own bedding. It is lighted with a few lamps. This room is not only bedroom but all the other rooms of a house. We are like hens, when we sit we stand. Can you imagine my surprise when about 1 a. m., Tuesday, I took my baggege aboard and turned into my bank? The place and the people! there are some

2:30 p. m.—Still in Strait; not past Vancouver Island yet, which is about 300 miles long. The mountain sceneral along both sides is simply grand. The mountains, covered with evergreen pines, extend from the water solge upward for thousands of feet, some of them snow-anopped with clouds existing
