It further remarked that the wheel "is much lighter and more under the control of its rider than vehicles of the other sort which are drawn by horses," and "in many cases, therefore, it is the duty of the rider of the bicycle to regulate his course and to make concession which probably the driver of a vehicle of burden ordinarily would not be obliged to do." It may be doubted whether such a ruling as this will stand, for as the New York Law journal says, "iff the principle be laid down that a bicyclist must always make "concessions" there could be no sort of definite rule for regulating his duty or fixing his liability."
