IMMENSE CIFTS OF CANADIAN MILLIONAIRE. W. C. McDonald Who Has Given More Than Two Million Dollars to an Educational Institution, About to Be Knighted by the British Queen.

Rumor has it that Mr. William C. fcDonald, the millionaire tobacco McDonald, the millionaire tobacco manufacturer, of Montreal, and the giver of huge sums to McGill Uni-versity, is to be Knighted in recogni-tion of his munificent contributions to the cause of education. Mr. McDonald is the youngest son of the late Hon. Donald McDonald, sometime president Donald McDonald, sometime president of the Legislative Council of Prince Edward Island, and grandson of Captain John McDonald, eighth chief of the Clan Macdonald of Glenaladale, who founded the Soltish settlements at Tracadie, Scotchfort, Glenfunan and Fort Augustus in Prince Edward island, and served during the American revolutionary was an expession. went to Montreal and became an importer and general commission merchant.
