TALMAGE'S SERMON.

PILLARS OF SMOKE, LAST SUN-DAY'S SUBJECT.

Text: Solomon's Song 3: 2: Who is This that cometh out of the Wilderness like Pillars of Smoke?—Suffering of God's Church.

The architecture of the smoke is wondrous, whether God with his finger curves it into a cloud or rounds it into a dome, or points it in a spire, or spreads it in a fan, or, as in the text, hoists it in a pillar.

Watch it winding up from the chimney farmhouse in the early morning, and you will see that the pastoral industries have begun; or, see it ascending from the chimneys of the city, telling of the homes fed, the factories turning out their wares, the printing presses preparing book and newspaper, and all the ten thousand forms of work in motion.
