The Present County Jail System is Condemned—A \$100,000 Plan is Offered—How One Man was Effort—Others get an Advance in Wages.

Michigan Crop Report.

The Michigan crop report for January, issued by the secretary of state, states that during the past year wheat has generally suffered in Michigan. There was very little precipitation in Michigan in January and during a few days of the month. The average depth of snow on the 15th was in the northern counties 0.16 of an inch, in the central 0.17 of an inch, and in the southern counties 0.67 inches, this last district showing great variation all through the month, the extremes being 1 and 30 inches, and in one location. On the 31st the average depth in the southern counties was 1.37 inches, in the central 1.24 inches, and in the northern 1.24 inches. The ground was practically bare during the month in most of the counties.

County Jail System Condemned.

The state board of corrections and charities will recommend legislation designed to radically change the system of managing county jails in Michigan. The board has reported that the present system of using existing jails is unworkable. It makes them filthy and unwholesome. Frequently persons arrested on some trivial charge are held in jail until they can find their way out. The annual report of Auditor-General Dix shows that the receipts of the state treasury from all sources during the year were \$1,212,539.36, and disbursements \$1,099,527.99, an excess of receipts of \$112,991.37. The balance in the treasury at the close of the year was \$1,212,539.36. The Largest Coal Vein in the State.

The Wenona Coal Co. will build coke ovens near the mine and coke their surplus coal. The capacity of the mine when in full operation will be 1,000 tons daily.

Will Receive Higher Wages.

In consequence of the recent advance in the price of iron ore for the coming season's delivery the mine managers of the Mesabi district have decided to give all employees an increase of 10 per cent, beginning on March 1. Had the companies withheld this advance it is likely that a demand for a strike soon had been made by the mine workers. The average pay of miners has been \$1.80 per day and no laborer received less than \$1.35.

DEAD HEROES OF THE WAR
