TRANSVAAL WAR ITEMS.

CONGRESSIONAL NOTES.

President McKinley, in conversation with callers at the White House on the 6th, reiterated his belief that the people of Porto Rico were entitled to free trade with the United States. At the same time, he said he was unable to subscribe to the theory that the condition of Porto Rico is such that the situation followed the flag, that the Puerto Ricans must have free trade as a necessary legal right.
