## ENTIRE REPUBLICAN STATE TICKET ELECTED IN MICHIGAN.

### SYNOPSIS OF FIRST REPORTS.

Odell was Re-elected Governor of New York—Republicans Made Gains in Ohio

Republicans Will Have Good Victory in Next Congress

Twenty-two states held elections Tuesday, Maine, Vermont, and New Hampshire, where their state officials and representatives in the fifty-eighth congress.

Nine states only elected congressmen; eleven states elected senators; and twenty-two elected governors, while state officials and congressmen.

Governors and other state officials were chosen in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, South Carolina, Alabama, Texas, Michigan, Kansas, Minnesota, North Dakota, Nebraska, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, Nevada, and California.

New Hampshire elects only a governor; Tennessee a governor and railroad commissioner; and Pennsylvania a governor and two other state officials.

Minor state officials or justices of the supreme court were voted for in Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Kansas, Georgia, Mississippi, Louisiana, West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland, Kentucky and New Jersey and Maryland.

The terms of 30 United States senators expire in 1903. Five already were re-elected, and the others already were elected by the voters.

James B. McKelvey (Dem., Ky.); John P. Morgan (Rep., Ohio); J. P. Buchanan (Rep., Vermont); and Samuel R. McHenry (Dem., Louisiana).

**Michigan.** Michigan voters elected the Republican ticket Tuesday, retaining control of the Legislature, though Governor Odell received a much smaller majority than on his first election, the Republican ticket being something like 40,000.
