MILFORD MAN TO BE HUNG

Charles Bullock to be Executed by Canadians.

Will Hang at Fort Saskatchewan, Northwest Territory, on March 26—Was Captured Through Information Received from Pontiac.

It is so many years since the last execution took place in Michigan when the law of capital punishment obtained, that it seems strange to learn that an Oakland county man is about to pay the death penalty by hanging, yet such is the case with Charles H. Bullock, formerly of Milford, who will be hanged under Canadian law at Fort Saskatchewan, Northwest Territory, on the 26th of this month. It was through information received from Pontiac that Bullock was apprehended by the Chief of Mounted Police Hetherington sent word to Kalamazoo officers.

Another of our representative pioneers who helped to redeem this part of Michigan from its wilderness state was laid to rest in Greenwood cemetery last Wednesday afternoon. The remains of Lewis Converse, former settler, Kalamazoo and honored citizen of Birmingham, were brought from Orono on the 11-45 train and services were held in the M. E. church at the noon hour, Rev. M. H. Harte officiating.

Mr. Converse was born in Danville, N. V., in 1833 and moved to Michigan with his parents when a child, there experiencing many features of pioneer life. He was married in 1854 to Prucella Harte of the same family and survives to mourn the loss of a devoted companion of nearly fifty years. He was the father of three children, namely, Mrs. Elizabeth Randall and H. L. Converse of Birmingham.

For thirty years on the M. E. Converse was a resident of this village and was one of our most prosperous business men, but for the last twelve years he had made his home in Orono. He had been in feeble health for the last three years and his children and grandchildren place will always remember with pleasure what proved to be his last visit, during the recent holiday season. The last weeks of his life were attended by great suffering, which was borne with Christian fortitude and resignation until death came as a sweet and peaceful release on Monday last.

Mr. Converse was converted over thirty years ago and lived an exemplary Christian life. He was well known by all who knew him, and without an enemy in the world. He was made a Master Mason by the Birmingham lodge over thirty years ago and about forty of the Birmingham brethren followed his remains to the grave, where the last rites were performed according to the Masonic ritual.

The owner is J. L. Campbell of this place, one of the three pension examiners for Oakland county, and the cane is the gift of Michael Crilbins of Orion, an old soldier whom the Dr. recently examined. Mr. Crilbins has a remarkably long record for wood carving, and seldom being in the forest of his home during the winter, makes a surprising use of his jack-knife in whiling away his leisure hours. Mr. Crilbins developed this talent while in the army, amusing himself by carving trinkets out of bones, "after first picking the meat from them," as he tells his friends. The cane presented to Dr. Campbell is made from a curiously twisted yellow stick, which has shown the Dr. in the rough on the occasion of his recent visit to Orion. It would take considerable time to discover all the curious things that are carved on the cane, among the first specimens of work being a tiny bird's nest containing two eggs, a wolf, and an ingenious suggestion of the Dr.'s name.
