DEATH OF A PIONEER.

Mrs. George Whiting Expires Suddenly While Walking in the Yard.
Mrs. George Whiting, a well known pioneer of Southfield township, expired suddenly at the home of her son, Charles Whiting, Wednesday evening, May 7, 1902. Mrs. Whiting had suffered with heart trouble for many years and fell to the ground while walking in the yard. Her son was at her side almost instantly but her spirit had already taken its flight to the great Beyond, where suffering is no more.
Elizabeth Jean Randall was born in Kingsville, Adirondack county, Ohio, on the 26th of June, 1834. She came to Southfield at the age of seven years and made her home in the township until her death. On the 15th of November, 1853, she was united in marriage to George Whiting and they became the parents of three children, the oldest dying at the age of two years. Mrs. Whiting died in 1872, and Mrs. Florence Whiting Mothers and Charles Whiting are now left to mourn the loss of one of the kindest and most unselfish mothers. She also leaves a brother, H. W. Randall of Birmingham, and a sister, Mrs. E. D. Cowles of Saginaw, four grandchildren and other dear friends to mourn her sudden departure.
Mrs. Whiting was converted in early life, united with the Methodist church at the age of 16, and lived a devoted and consistent Christian life.
The funeral was held at the home of her son on Saturday, Rev. M. H. Hartman officiating, and interment was in Greenwood cemetery.
