E. church last Thursday and Friday evening, and the unusual size of the class necessitating two evenings for the entertainment. The church was handsomely decorated for the occasion, the principal feature being the elaborate drappings of white and orange lining—the class colors. The platform was banked with choice flowering and foliage plants, while above, and across a draping of the class colors, appeared in gilt letters the class motto: "Honor waits at learning's gate." The reserved portions of the audience room was shut off by a unique gateway across the central aisle and through which the class, led by Capt. Waldo, passed to their places on the platform to the strains of the entrance march played both evenings by Miss Doty. A large and appreciative audience greeted the young people at both entertainments.

Following the invocation by Rev. M. H. Bartram Thursday evening, a brilliant piano solo was rendered by Miss Collins of Pontiac. The first speaker of the evening was Fred Erb, whose thoughtful declamation was entitled "Our Duties to the Republic."

McKinley's address at the Buffalo exposition was selected as a recitation by Miss Minnie Ford and given a very creditable rendering. Mr. Chiles of Detroit, who is always gladly welcomed by a Birmingham audience, then gave a fine vocal solo and was heartily received.

"Who are Really Honored?" was the question answered by Lloyd Campbell's declamation, which was given with good effect.

"The Desire of Nations," was the title of Miss Carrie Mitchell's selection in which the Millennium King was pointed out as fulfilling Earth's desire for a brighter and better age.

Miss Estelle Denison then gave a humorous selection, entitled "The Book Crusader," with creditable elocutionary effect.

Miss Clara Merrill filled her part of the class program with a brilliant piano solo, receiving an encore to which she responded.

"A Man's Capacity for Education" was the subject of John Wilbur's declamation, in which man's differentiation from the brute creation was shown.

Miss Gertrude Gray was the next speaker, the title of her selection being "The Statue," and her rendering was well received.

The program Friday evening opened with invocation by Rev. Mr. Watson, which was followed by a vocal solo, "Spring is Here," by Miss Bartram. Miss Bartram never fails to please, and being called back responded with "Fishing," Miss Doty was her accompanist on the piano.

Harold Corson was the first speaker on the program that evening and gave a spirited rendering of Roosevelt's Minneapolis address.

"How He Saved St. Michael's" was a thrilling poem on an incident in slavery days and was effectively rendered by Miss Mabel Allen.

A WORTHY SUCCESSOR Crowds Going to the Circus.

To Ira Reid is Ellsworth Randall at the Village Water Works.

The village Water Works house, pump and reservoir are kept up in their usual manner as the late employee, Mr. Ira Reid, originated. Ellsworth Randall is the right man in the right place and he has his position. Mr. Randall is away up in his profession as engineer, he has overhauled the pump, engine, boiler and all the appurtenances belonging thereto, and now has the whole plant in line running order. For the past nine years a patent automatic water pressure regulator has been in a state of repair never used. No one engineer in a hundred understands this delicate part of the pump, but Mr. Randall is "it." He spent three whole nights, after closing down the pumps, grinding in a double disc expansion valve. He finished it to perfection, and now it is the correct part of the whole plant. As the valve works now, the water pressure under a fire is regulated automatically, and one man that understands its working in a better way while a fire is in progress than three or four could the old way. No matter what the steam pressure is at any time the water pressure in the mains remains steady and always the same. He will be pleased to show his contrivance work—it is very ingenious. He has also been repairing the boilers and now announces that as well as the pumping station. Mr. Randall is quite as anxious as the rest of us for more water and, in fact, steps have already been taken to insure to the water users of Birmingham all the water that can be used, and we say: "Hasten the day!"
