## MUNICIPAL COURT IS IN FAVOR

Ispheming Wants to Adopt Method in Veggie at the So.  
The substitution of municipal court for the justice of the peace has become such a success at Sault Ste. Marie, where it has been tried for the past year, that the city council is determined to do likewise. The necessary amendment to the city charter will be drafted and the legislature requested to make the change. At the time the new scheme resulted in a profit to the city of \$120,000 in one year, after all the expenses of the court had been paid, and the justice of the peace system was a constant drain on the city treasury.

## Get Many Snakes

As several men were engaged in digging post-holes on the Air Line railway, west of Three Rivers, they unearthed 37 snakes, 13 inches below the surface, all of them being in a dormant condition. There were five blue snakes, one rattler, one water snake and the balance ordinary garter snakes. One of the rattlers measured five feet in length, and the rattler had two rattles. ## Raises Chestnuts

He says they grow with about the rapidity of apple trees and have already commenced bearing fruit. He planted them the same as he would peach trees and cultivates between the rows. In the same hole with the chestnut trees he has planted more trees in the spring. In twenty years he expects to have a valuable lot of timber on his farm.

## More Insurance

Insurance Commissioner Barry is receiving applications for licenses to do business in this state. Nearly all the companies report an increase in the amount of Michigan business transacted. In some cases the increase is as high as 100 per cent in the amount of premiums received as compared to the receipts of the previous year.

## Courthouse Is Paid For

Hillsdale county courthouse, which was built some four or five years ago, has now been paid for. The cost of the building was \$45,000, having just been paid. A most unusual thing about the building is that it is built on a hillside. The building is a fine example of modern architecture and is a credit to the county.
