She has present paid an annuity by the territory, as she was previously by the republic of Hawaii and the provision of government, but it has always been under an act of courtesy and not as a recognition of any claim of right to it.

Now the toothbrush has put paddles into the hands of the medical experts. A British authority comes out with the statement that in addition to carrying germs concealed among the bristles it is one of the causes of appendicitis. The germs can be killed by washing the brush with an antiseptic solution. It is admitted, but it is not so easy to get rid of the germs. This dread but fashionable malady is caused, says the British physician, by the bristles becoming loosened, being swallowed and lodging in the appendix. Thus far no suggestion has been made for a substitute for the toothbrush.

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Where Nutmegs are Grown.
The nutmeg supply of England and her colonies is almost entirely in the hands of Dutchmen. The bulk comes from the Island of Banda and over 90 per cent of the world's crop from the Dutch West Indies. The fruiting powers of the trees are remarkable. They start fruiting when about twelve years old and yield regularly for sixty or eighty years. They carry blossoms and fruits without intermission through every month of the year.
Search for Baron Toll.
Baron Toll, whose polar expedition left St. Petersburg on June 21, 1909, has not been heard from since June 21, 1912, when he left the ship Sars with the astronomer Seeborg, home for Bennett Island. On Feb. 22 last Lieut. Koltchak, one of the members of the original expedition, while in the meantime returned to the Russian capital, left it again to search for Baron Toll in New Siberia. He wrote to the latest report that he has as yet found no traces of him.
