Method as an Egg Preserver.

Saline brine was made by dissolving ninety grains (about two and one-fourth ounces) of common table salt in 1,500 cubic centimeters of distilled water. To each quart of distilled water, add 100 cc. of a 1 per cent solution of formalin. On May 18, 1899, twenty fresh eggs were washed, placed in a steril jar and the brine poured over them until all were fully covered by the liquid. Result Good, 90 per cent; bad, 10 per cent. On opening the jar, May 31, 1900, a stinking odor was noted. The shells of the eggs were, however, clean and clear. The whites were clear and watery. The yolks were like thick gum clear through, and were tricked into nearly perfectly formed globules, with heightened reddish color. The eggs were clean and briny. The eggs were not usable.
