

THE POPE IS DEAD

Leo XIII, Passed Peacefully Away at 4:04 Monday

Pope Leo XIII, died shortly after 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. His last moments were comparatively peaceful and painless and were preceded by a brief period of unconsciousness. He succumbed to the illness which he had contracted at the Vatican, and the members of the papal curia.

Before lapsing into unconsciousness the dying pontiff freely voiced his hope that his death would be the end of all wars and bloodshed.

Gradually the shadow of death spread over the pontiff, his extremities became cold, his features assumed the fixed rigidity of death, and Dr. Lajolo noted his final dying breaths, which gradually became slower until they finally stopped.

The news of the pope's death spread rapidly throughout Rome and caused a most profound sorrow. The whole city in mourning. Pope Leo was taken with his final illness on Saturday, July 4, contracting a cold from drives in the Vatican gardens. The case was at once diagnosed as acute meningitis, the treatment being administered by the pope's physician, who called in Dr. Mazzoli, the surgeon who operated on Leo for the removal of a cyst in 1908.

A scientific opinion developed in the progress of the disease and two operations were performed, which each time temporarily relieved the aged patient, but at no time did the doctors give him hope of recovery, although his boldness made several remarkable rallies during his two weeks' illness.

The dead pope, Leo XIII, has during through all the painful physical or his illness shown not only a remarkable clear and active, showable vitality for a man 93 years old, but also a fortitude under severe suffering that is extremely rare. The evening of the eighth day, the corpse will be incensed in two coffins, the inner one of cypress and the outer of lead, which will be deposited within a stone sarcophagus. It will not be immediately committed to its final resting place, but will be deposited high over the door near the choir of a chapel in St. Peter's, where it may be viewed by all visitors.

The ultimate burial place will be the magnificent basilica of St. John Lateran. Following Pope Leo's expressed wish, the site in which it will be interred is that which the pope designated as the resting place. Tuesday morning the recognition of the death of the pope was officially performed by Cardinal Grego, which will carry out the ceremony of tapping the pope's breast and forehead with the golden lance. In the afternoon, Lajolo will have the body carried to the adjoining room, called the Little Chamber, where Pope Leo recently received King Edward and Emperor William. There the body will be eulogized by the pope's nephew, the cardinal of St. Peter's, remaining there three days after which the funeral will occur. It is generally believed that the coffin will rest Aug. 3.
