

THE ELECTION OF PRESIDENT.

HIS ELECTION BY SWEEPING MAJORITY WAS CONCEDED EARLY.

EARLY RETURNS SHOW THE REPUBLICANS WENT HIGH FROM END TO END--LIST OF SUCCESSFUL CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATES.

THE NATION'S VOICE.

Roosevelt's Great Victory--Congress Goes With Him. President Hoover probably will have 345 electoral votes as the result of Tuesday's balloting. Late unofficial returns give a basis for this estimate.

RESULT IN MICHIGAN.

Warner, Congressional Delegation and Legislature by George Majors. Surprising as the results of Tuesday's election were, Michigan added to them. Fred M. Warner was elected governor by a majority estimated at 50 per cent larger than that of Aaron T. Bliss over L. T. Durant two years ago, and the entire Republican state ticket, including every state senatorial

and legislative candidate was elected, according to the latest returns. The Wolverine state gives Theodore Roosevelt an unprecedented majority, which will exceed 120,000 when the returns are in. It was a landslide astounding to even the most sanguine Republican, Michigan will have a solid Republican delegation in congress, as every Republican candidate for reelection was victorious by good majorities, and Edwin Denby in Detroit defeated Alfred Lacking, the only Democratic member of the present delegation.

Majority in Congress. The president's victory is assured by the cooperation of a Republican congress. The present Republican majority in that body is 34. The new house will probably have a majority of 100, or close to that number.

It is probable the Republican majority in the senate will show little if any change from the present voting strength there. Of the 35 members, that body, 57 are Republicans and 33 Democrats. The terms of 30 senators expire March 4 next. Of these 25 are Republicans and they or their successors will be Republicans. Of the seven Democrats, two, Cockerill, of Missouri, and Gibson, of Montana may be replaced by Republicans.
