Some Common Orchard Scale Insects. The Ohio Experiment Station is receiving from all parts of the state reports of fruit trees infested with one or more of the following scale insects: 1. The Oyster-shell scale. This is a reddish or grayish brown scale, about the size of a pin's head, and is found at one end and curved in shape, suggesting a minute, elongated oyster-shell. Its winter form is a hard scale, and its procreant a number of minute, white eggs. These eggs hatch during the fore part of June, and the young scale crawls about for a few days, then settles on the bark and begins sucking the sap. At this time the scale is destroyed by spraying with kerosene emulsion, or by the use of which is given in the Station spray calendar, which are sent free on application.

Experiments made by the Canada Experiment Farms have shown that this scale may also be controlled by a contact insecticide. The scale may be killed by the use of one or two pounds of lime to a gallon of water. This should be done as early in the winter as possible, so that the scale may be removed before the rain removes them and destroys the eggs. 2. The curly scale. This insect is a small, round, white scale, about the size of a pin's head, and is found in small numbers on the leaves and fruit of the apple tree. It is more numerous because of its white color. Testing Vitality of Seeds. Owing to the unfavorable season of 1903 many kinds of seeds failed to mature properly and it is probable that the farmer has many inferior growers during the present season. Prof. W. M. Munson, horticulturist to the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station, has devised a method of testing seeds, whereby it is possible for every farmer to know just what to expect from his corn, oats, peas, clover or any other crop that he may be planting. If he knows that only 50 per cent of his corn will germinate, it is an easy matter to plant twice as much; but if he knows that only 10 per cent will germinate, he should plant only half as much, the case is much more serious.
