THE VILLAGE OF BIRMINGHAM ORDINANCES
SECTION 1. Subject to the terms and conditions of this ordinance here is hereby granted to the Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, the right and privilege to construct, acquire, operate and maintain gas pipes, gas mains and necessary attachments for supplying Acetylene gas in the village of Birmingham, State of Michigan, and defining the rights, privileges and liabilities of the Standard Heating and Lighting Company.

SECTION 2. That before said the Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, shall open any improved street, alley, public highway, or other public place for the purpose aforesaid, it shall cause notice of its intention to do so to be given to the corporation of the village, specifying in such notice the street, or portion thereof, and when any such improved street, alley or public place is proposed at such place, it shall be the duty of the Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, to cause the same to be properly restored to the same and to the satisfaction of the village.

SECTION 3. Whenever said the Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, shall open any improved street, alley, public highway, or other public place within said village for the purpose of laying pipes, thereon, no such pipes shall be laid or erected by said village of Birmingham, and shall be the duty of the Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, to cause the same to be properly restored to the same and to the satisfaction of the village.

SECTION 4. In all cases where the Standard Heating and Lighting Company or its successors, lessees or assigns, shall open any improved street, alley, public highway, or other public place within said village for the purpose of laying pipes, thereon, no such pipes shall be laid or erected by said village of Birmingham, and shall be the duty of the Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, to cause the same to be properly restored to the same and to the satisfaction of the village.

SECTION 5. The said Standard Heating and Lighting Company, its successors, lessees or assigns, shall be liable to the village for any cost incurred thereby.
