MICHIGAN EDUORS PAY VISIT TO MODEL FACTORY AT DAYTON

Healthful Working Conditions and Educational Opportunities Benefit Employees--Company's Broad Policy of Welfare Work Includes Luncheons, Baths, Library, Rest Rooms

A visit to the model factory of the world, the plant of the National Cash Register Company at Dayton, Ohio, was a part of the annual outing of the Western Michigan Press Association, October 28.

This factory is one of the principal show places of Dayton and a visit to it is a liberal education in up-to-date factory methods. In fact, in its treatment of employees, its "Welfare Work," the Company is way ahead of the age.

Welfare Work at the N. C. R. plant has three things for last--healthful working conditions, pleasant surroundings and educational opportunities. The healthful working conditions begin with huge, airy workrooms, perfectly lighted and ventilated and scrupulously clean.

ery, vine-covered buildings, and a neighborhood made beautiful with trees, vines and flowers. The educational opportunities embrace schools and classes of many kinds for men and women, a well-stocked library, literary and social clubs, and educational trips to other factories, to exhibitions, to the great cities and even to Europe.

Care for Employees' Health. The care of the Company for the physical well-being of its employees is first of all in the construction of the factory buildings. Large windows afford light and air in abundance. An efficient ventilating system changes the air throughout the factory buildings every fifteen minutes.

There is an officers' school where the President or General Manager meets the heads of departments and assistants for lectures and conferences. There is an advertising school, where campaigns of publicity are planned.

The employees of the N. C. R. cooperate with the management in Welfare Work through two organizations, the Men's Welfare League and the Women's Century Club. The object of the Men's Welfare League, which has 2500 members, is to secure improvement of working conditions through out the world.

League Conducts Neighborhood House. Under the auspices of the Men's Welfare League, a neighborhood "betterment house" has been established near the factory, where the people meet and where classes are conducted in carving, sewing, drawing, embroidery and basketry.

In August the League, with the cooperation of the Century Club, conducted a vacation camp at Port Hope, Michigan, where 1700 factory workers with their wives and children enjoyed a ten days' outing at a rental cost of \$1.80 apiece, including railroad fare.

A branch of Welfare Work conducted excursions for 2000 employees to the St. Louis World's Fair. A branch of Welfare Work conducted a picnic at the grounds of the neighborhood in that of landscape gardening. At the time when Welfare Work was started the surroundings of the factory were like those of the most industrial plants--anything

but attractive. After the Company had made its own property beautiful with lawns, shrubbery and vines, it taught the people of the neighborhood, by the plan of landscape gardening, the principles of landscape gardening.

In connection with each of the women's departments a rest room is provided where any girl who may retire when ill or over-fatigued. A trained nurse is in constant attendance, and the Company's physician is within easy call.

D. & B. C. TRACTION

It's Alive and Work Will Be Started Immediately.

The Detroit Times in its issue of Oct. 7th says, "The Detroit & Bay City Traction Co. is projecting a new line from Bay City to Detroit to run down through Caro, Lapeer, Mayville, Pontiac and Birmingham to this city."

The company filed a trust mortgage running to the Union Trust Co. as trustee Friday with the register of deeds in this city to cover an issue of bonds amounting to \$1,500,000.

The bonds have been underwritten by New York and Chicago bankers, and the funds are now said to be available for pushing the road through to completion.

"The line is to be built under a charter secured this week by John H. Christian and L. A. Rockefeller, who formerly lived in Chicago but who are now living in Detroit, and E. H. Whitcomb, recently identified himself pushing this line through to completion, says Attorney Moore."

The new line wants to enter Detroit and will cooperate with the city on any reasonable terms to be able to do so. The men who are handling the project have told the city that they will build the line down Hamilton boulevard and on its desirable streets through to the downtown section, they will be glad to lease the line on the basis of 5 per cent on the cost, and they will maintain the tracks and give a three cent fare. If the city would prefer to have the company build the line, then they will do so on a three cent franchise with an agreement to turn the tracks over to the city at any time the city wants them.

TEACHER, FARMER WAS JOHN DOHANY, WHO DIED RECENTLY. Was a Prominent Resident of Farmington for Many Years.

John Dohany, for many years a well-known school teacher and farmer, died recently at his late residence, 1194 Fourth avenue. A hard worker all his life, his system simply broke down. He was born in New Brunswick, N. J., on July 14, 1835. In 1857, with his parents, he came to the city of Detroit, but his stay was but for a few weeks, when his father took up a farm in the township of Farmington, Oakland county.

When the first school was erected in Driggs district, although but 17 years of age, he was made school master and continuing to do so for more than 30 years.
