The men whose names are among the world's most precious possessions have ever been the most eccentric of the most normal of mankind. The names of Shakespeare, Goethe, and Beethoven will remember Pieri di Costanzo, that misanthropic painter who lived completely isolated from his fellows in his great, small studio, with his garden of weeds and flowers growing rankly as they would, because he preferred them to his fellow men. He was a great painter, and even more loathsome creature; his diet consisting wholly of eggs, lamb chops, and mushrooms, which he required, no matter what the season, Goya, the Spanish Rembrandt, was the wildest and most irascible of men. When he sat for the portrait of the Duke of Wellington he kept the dog, Waterloo in a right attitude for hours, at the least movement threatening him with a dagger, and when the duke complained of weariness the painter seized a plaster cast and hurled it at his head. Michael Angelo's method of working was one of his great eccentricities. Often he would get up in the middle of the night to hack and beat his hammer by the light of a single candle fastened to the visor of his cap, and then, worn by his great labors, he would throw himself down to sleep without removing his cap or his shoes—sometimes keeping the latter on the floor when they were in the way. Fattening of Old Fowls.

Old fowls are much more easily fattened than young ones. A hen four or five years of age will gain a little trouble. About the only extra attention she needs is confinement. It is often the case that some fowl in the yard has an injury to her feet so that she does not walk around. In a few months she becomes fat. If her egg-producing powers are destroyed, she will lay eggs, using up the energy and food that she would have used for laying on eggs for the hen that has an injury to her feet. A hen that weighed five pounds when she was laying eggs reach a weight of ten pounds during the summer after she had ceased to produce eggs and was placed in confinement. This is too fat for use, but it shows that her readiness old hens may be fattened.

The Demand for Eggs.

The demand for eggs is unspeakably great, especially in the large cities and establishments that take eggs in large quantities. The great hotels have much difficulty in getting the eggs they need. It is nearly all of them are looking for some one farmer that can supply a large number of dozens of eggs daily. We have known hotels that take 25 dozen eggs a day at 25 cents a dozen the year round, provided they could find some one man that could supply them with eggs. It is as yet there are very few farms that are so well managed that such a production could be kept up throughout the year. Here is certainly an opportunity for development.

Use of Trap Nets.

Trap nets are used where the flock is large enough to make it profitable to keep a man about the premises. The principle of the trap net is to have a net set out after she has laid an egg. She must remain in confinement until she is let out by an attendant. It is evident that she cannot be left there in that case the others would drop their eggs outside the nest. On most farms the trap net is impracticable on account of the difficulty of keeping some one always on hand to attend to this duty. Trap nets are largely used at experimental stations, and on large poultry farms where attendants are always about.

The Double Yolks Eggs.

Some one asks if the double yolked egg will hatch. Another person answers that it will hatch very likely, but the man that gave the answer did not know. There have been several double yolked eggs that has not seen. It is not desirable to keep a double yolked egg to hatch monstrosities, and now for no reason for doubting that eggs and then a double yolked egg has hatched. It may have produced a pair of chickens, or it may have produced one chicken with double parts. The matter is not, however, of enough importance to warrant investigation.

Color of Yolks of Eggs.

The yolks of eggs differ very much in color. Some are a very light yellow, some are a very dark yellow. The cause of this variation may be found in several things. The chief of these is the composition of food. Some farmers say that when their poultry receive a large supply of green food, the yolks have a darker color. It is not a supply of green food is limited.

Dots After Leghorns.
Oats are especially helpful by being grown after leguminous crops. On many soils it would pay to grow some seedling legume in plant early in the fall, and allow the crop to make a considerable growth before being plowed under. These oats would be better sown after the vetch, or other pod-bearing crop, has been inoculated with nitrogen producing bacteria. If the field had not previously been in some pod-bearing crop.
