Mrs. C. Algrim, under the care of Dr. Shaw, is able to be up and around.

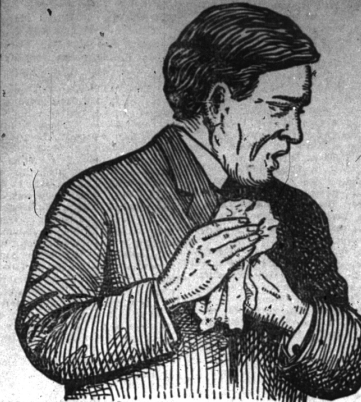
G. C. Jackson has just finished his apple crop, and by report he has had his share.

The most interesting point on the field of Waterloo is Hougovment farm, the scene of the battle of the great battle of June 18, 1815, waged. Today it presents a very peaceful appearance. Sheep graze in the orchard fields, the terraced and the woods and the content, and chickens walk about in the farmyard where perished some of the best men of both armies. The farm was one of the first objects of Napoleon's attack at Waterloo. It lay in a valley between the two armies, and the Duke of Wellington had stationed the Col. Stuart, and a detachment under Lieut. Col. Macdonell. These were variously distributed in the trenches, the garden, and some high stone wall which surrounds the farm on all sides was pierced with holes for musketry, and Wellington erected a scaffolding inside the orchard so that the men could fire over the wall. The whole of Reille's corps, consisting of 30,000 men, some of the finest soldiers in the French army, was concentrated on Hougovment farm, which Napoleon hoped to take quickly by storm.

As a matter of fact, the position was never taken, and the French army, having passed the means throughout that fatal July 18th to capture it. Wellington threw reinforcements into the place from time to time, but so strong that the woods and gardens surrounding the farm were taken and recaptured not less than six times. The allied forces lost in this attack on Hougovment twenty-eight officers and also hundreds of men, while various authorities give the loss of the French at one thousand. Lord Dudley said in one of his letters, speaking of Hougovment farm: "This Belgian woman's garden was the advantage of Europe, and the destiny of mankind turned upon the possession of his house." Battlefields guide points to a wall in the interior field, the garden, which Napoleon is said to have thrown 300 of his wounded who were beyond the means of aid. A little chapel, also within the garden, is thought by the peasantry to have been the scene of a miracle. Though Napoleon set fire to the buildings and chapel, the fire stopped at the foot of a crucifix, which is shown today with much veneration.—The Sketch.
