WAS HIGHLY ESTEEMED BY ALL WHO KNEW HIM.

Funeral Services Were Held Tuesday at His Late Home on Pierce Street, This Village.

We mourn the loss this week of one who has lived not many years in Birmingham, yet he endeavored himself during the short time to be of service to many friends.

Mr. Brey was born in Locking county, Ohio, in 1833. His father was a minister of the gospel, and in that boyhood home our brother acquired many of the elements of character which later made him so truly a gentleman.

Mr. Brey was always upright and honorable in business. He knew the worth of friendship and made friends wherever he went.
