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at different temperatures, according to the elevation above the sea level. In London water boils practically at 212 degrees Fahrenheit; in Munich, Germany, at 209 1/2 degrees; in the City of Mexico, at 200 degrees; and in the Himalayas, at an elevation of 18,000 feet above the level of the sea, at 180 degrees. These differences are caused by the varying pressure of the atmosphere at different elevations. In London the weight of the air has to be overcome. In Mexico, 7,000 feet above the sea, the air has a cutting edge, and the water is resisted. Consequently less heat is required and boiling takes place at a lower temperature.
