CONSTITUTION.

Article 1.—Name. First.—To insure, so far as possible, a permanent condition of peace, prosperity and employment, to the people of Battle Creek.

Second.—To energetically assist in maintaining law and order at all times and in all places.

Third.—To protect its members in their rights to manage their property in their own way, without any unlawful manner without restraint or interference.

Fourth.—To insure and permanently maintain a few labor unions, to be known as peaceful unions and in proportion as they are worthy, they have won esteem, for we, as a people, are strongly in favor of the right of every man to have for his purpose better conditions than for wage workers.

Fifth.—To preserve the existing right of any capable person to obtain employment, to sell his labor, and to be obliged to join any particular church, secret society, labor union or any other organization, and to support all such persons in their efforts to resist compulsory methods on the part of any organized body whatsoever.

Sixth.—To promote among employers and employees a spirit of friendship and desire for the best interests of their employees, and to promote among workers the spirit of industry, thrift, fairness to their employers and good citizenship.
