Receiver For Oswego Bank.

The receiver, J. W. Shattuck, Michigan Savings Machine & Organ Co., Thos. O. Christian and John J. O'Connell, who were appointed receiver, filed a report to the court.

The action of four depositors does not mean that the petitioners are satisfied with the receiver's report.
