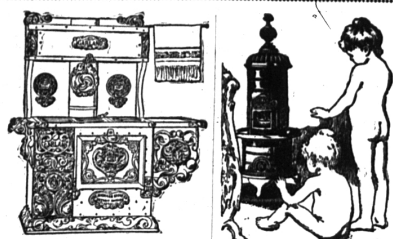

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A STUDY IN STONE

That is What T. G. Holmes' New Residence Appears to Be.

BIRMINGHAM PROOF OF BUILDING. The Dwelling is Supplied with all Modern Conveniences and Will Prove an Ideal Home for this Worthly Family.

A veritable 'study in stone' is what an eccentric representative found one day last week when in company with Mr. T. G. Holmes he was made to the new home he is building adjoining the town on the east.

The house consists of two stories and is of that style of architecture known as Colonial. The lower story is built entirely of stone—and such stone—was had from the quarries of the town.

The second story of the building is made of cement blocks, both hollow and veneer, and is almost an exact imitation of the stone.

There is a large 'Porte Cochere' on the south side of the house in the form of an arch, made of stone and every part of the building is finished in a thoroughly dignified and workmanlike manner.

There is a veranda which extends three-quarter way across the front of the building, very wide with heavy stone columns. Stone steps lead up to this, and right here the blending of colors spoken of above is very easily distinguished.

The building is all ready for plastering and the contract for this work has been let to Irving H. Wilson, of Birmingham, and it goes without saying that his work will also be done well.

The painting contract is let to Elmer Munro, of this place, and will be done in his usual workmanlike manner. The first floor will be in antique oak, the second floor in black mahogany.

The plastering contract has been awarded to Louis Holter, of Pontiac, and will be completed in every essential. The heating contract will be looked after by the Marshall Furnace Company, of Marshall, Mich.
