OVER A SCORE PERISHED IN THE GREAT GALE ON SUPERIOR

SEVEN LIVES LOST WITHIN FORTY-EIGHT HOURS WHILE ON PLEASURE TRIP

MRS. NIND, "THE LITTLE BISHOP" PERISHES IN A BURNING HOTEL

More than a score of lives were lost and property valued at half a million dollars destroyed in a furious storm that swept over Lake Superior from Friday night to Sunday night, according to reports received.

The steamer Sevona, which broke in two on Sand Island reef, seven of the crew including the captain, losing their lives, the barge Pretoria, of Bay City, Mich., ran aground with her cargo, five sailors drowning. The new steel steamer Stackhouse arrived at the Soo from her first trip with her cargo covers badly sprung that water poured continually into the hold. One of the lifeboats, the whole length steamer Samuel Mather also lost one of its lives overboard. The cargo of the Sevona is \$170,000, while that of the Pretoria is \$150,000.

The Pretoria, owned by the Alton and South Chicago with a cargo of iron, in tow of the steamer Venezuela, was wrecked in the Apostle group Saturday morning. Capt. Smart and ten sailors put off for the vessel. The crew was all starved for food.

After striking through the terrible sea, the Pretoria was wrecked and all were thrown into the water. Capt. Smart and four of the crew managed to get to the right boat again, but the other five sailors were overcome by the waves.

The dead: Henry Schwab, engineer; Axel Fiedel, Isaac Meyer, Allan and John LaFollette, colored cook, who shipped at Duluth.

Detroit Home's Desolate. Several people were killed within eighteen hours the two accidents but thirty miles apart, is a record that strikes grief to every heart. Monday night the Detroit Home, owned by Attorney James H. Pound, of Detroit, and two girl companions were wrecked by capsizing in the open bay.

TOUGH STORY. RELEASED CONVICT'S STARTLING TALE OF WOE.

Alleging among other things that he had been in the Michigan State Penitentiary for a longer time than the law allows, until he was released, he has actually called himself "the toughest" in the state.

MIKAKO'S THANKS ARE WARM AND VERY SIGNIFICANT.

President Roosevelt has received from the emperor of Japan the following expression of thanks of appreciation for the part played by the president in the negotiations which have resulted in the cessation of hostilities in the east.

Tokyo, September 3, 1905.—The emperor of Japan has received with great satisfaction your message of congratulations conveyed through our plenipotentiaries and thank you warmly for your disinterested and unselfish efforts in the interests of peace and justice.

The cablegram from the Japanese emperor put the end to the rumors that the emperor was dissatisfied with the terms finally concluded by his plenipotentiaries.
