"Yes, Childron."—Yes, I understand. It is always the biggest fish that gets away."

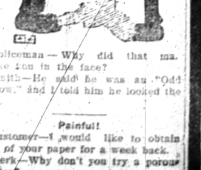
**A Safe Guess.**
