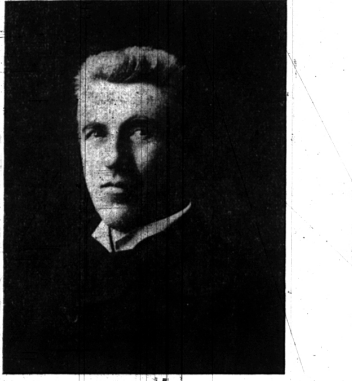

The Peoples Mining Co. of Wilcox, Arizona, of which T. A. Ward was the fiscal agent, has received their stock books and had to share or sell at any price. The success of this company has been phenomenal and only about a year ago with a capital of \$1,000,000, they will have less than \$100,000. Their mill will be running full blast by July first and will have a capacity of one hundred tons a day. The ore is mainly silver and lead, although gold and copper in large paying quantities are also found.
