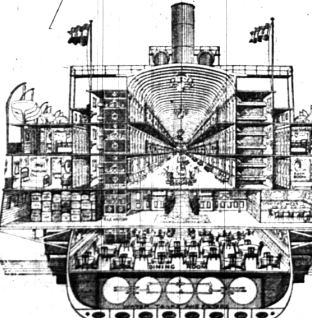
HAS CISTERN FOR HOME. SHE PREFERRED TO STAND
