FOR A COMPANY DINNER

Filled Chicken Very Nice to Serve at Sunday Dinner—Recipe for a Summer Drink.

Jellied chicken is very nice for a company tea or Sunday dinner. Dress, clean and cut a four-pound fowl. Put it in a kettle with a sliced onion, a stalk of celery, and two or three slices of carrot. Cover with boiling water, and cook until the meat falls from the bones. When half cooked add a tablespoon of salt. Remove the chicken when cooked, and free from skin and bones. Boil the stock to three-fourths of a cup, season it if needed, strain, and skim off the fat. Decorate the bottom of a buttered pudding dish with the stock. Pack in the chicken meat, nicely seasoned, pour on the stock, cover, and place the mold under a heavy weight. Keep in a cool place until firm. If the weather is warm it is better to add one-half a tablespoonful of granulated gelatin to the stock.

Apple Snow

Grate a medium-sized tart apple, peeled, and set aside. Whip stiff the white of one egg with a pinch of salt, then add one tablespoon of the grated apple, alternating with a cup of sugar a little at a time until sugar and apple have been quite used, then continue to beat the mixture until it rises to at least one and one-half cups in quantity, for it will swell surprisingly. Cooked apples may also be used in this recipe. Cook for five or six minutes, and add one egg white to each apple or nut may be added or fresh grated coconut, all giving increased food value.
