

A GREAT DEMAND O. E. S. OFFICERS PAINT YOUR CARS ANNUAL REUNION

For Real Estate at Bloomfield Hills For Summer Homes--New Booth Home a Big Feature.

Proprietor Chittenden, of the Hotel Ponchartrai, Detroit, is making some extensive improvements on his lot at Bloomfield Hills, preparatory to erecting a fine new mansion on the same.

It is stated that Detroit parties are negotiating with the Trowbridge boys for a portion of their farm at Bloomfield Hills for the erection of a handsome country villa but the deal has not yet been consummated.

W. W. Fendleton, of Detroit, has purchased the tract of land along the electric road just south of the Conklin place and intends to erect a fine new mansion.

There are but few of the real estate movements that are going on all of the time at Bloomfield Hills, which is fast becoming known as a centre for fashionable country homes.

The Booth house, "Anchorage," formerly the Samuel Alexander farm, has undergone a most wonderful change. Ten-thousand rose bushes were set out last season, and winding drives, cascades, rivulets, etc., make the grounds resemble one grand park.

A new house, estimated to cost over \$80,000 is now being built. The structure is to be built of pressed brick and field stone, three stories high.

Large porches with stone supporting columns will grace the front of the structure and a spacious terrace will set off the third side. The interior finish of the house will be lavish in every respect, no expense being saved to provide it with every known convenience.

The entrance reception hall is a spacious room in the center of the edifice with its massive stone fire place and winding staircase. The hall is large enough to be used as a dance hall.

One side the living room opens into the hall with a large arch, and on the other side the dining room occupies a similar place. An office, or study, is provided in the rear of the main hall.

The kitchen, servants quarters, and laundry with pantry, refrigerator rooms and closets are at the left of the dining room and conveniently arranged on the first floor.

On the second floor there are five large bed rooms and five baths. Each room, both upstairs and down, is fitted with an open fireplace. The third floor is devoted to a large play room, another sleeping apartment and a bath room.

The grounds are to be surrounded by a cement retaining wall, and will be attractively laid out with lawns and flower beds. One of the novel features of the grounds will be a hanging pergola.

The cement walk-lined with cement pillars and covered, leading from the side porch to a pavilion at the rear of the grounds, giving a most artistic effect.

A garage will be complete with two bays. When completed, May 1, 1908, the country residence will be one of the finest in the state.

FOR GASOLINE A Bright Red and Avoid Of the Fifth Michigan Cavalry Held In Detroit--A Happy Time for the Old Veterans.

To provide for the regulation of the sale by dealers and the keeping on hand by consumers, of gasoline, the people of the State of Michigan enact:

SECTION 1. Every person dealing at retail in gasoline, benzine or naphtha shall deliver the same to the purchaser in barrels, casks, packages or other painted vermilion red and having the word "gasoline," "benzine," or "naphtha" plainly stenciled thereon.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the State Oil Inspectors and its deputies to enforce the provisions of this act; and their compensation and expenses while so engaged shall be paid from the fund derived from inspection of illuminating oil.

SECTION 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of section one of this act shall be punished by a fine of not less than five nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court, before whom such conviction was had.

SECTION 4. Act number one hundred eighty-one of the laws of eighteen hundred ninety-nine is hereby repealed.

This act is ordered to take effect November 1, 1907.
