Electricity the Agent That Makes it the Town Wonder.

A citizen of Troyes has constructed a house for himself which is the wonder of the town and, it is said, of France. Naturally, the wonder is accomplished by means of electricity. There are electric wires to every part of the house and garden. There is such a number of ingenious contrivances that it looks as if he had actually achieved the domestic servant problem.

A telephone connects every part of the premises with the garden. As a result, the visitor can get into the house by "What's the matter?" When he has given his name the master welcomes him through the telephone and the visitor has only to wait until the visitor has entered. In the vestibule, before he is aware of it, magic brushes clean his boots, and the electric bell rings to inform him of the master's house.
