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SCHOOL NOTES

The Birmingham High School is Certainly Booming Under Its Present Excellent Corps of Teachers.

The kindergarten has been opened and is under the supervision of Mrs. Van Vorstenburg, of the Clara Wheeler kindergarten school of Grand Rapids. Mrs. VanVorstenburg comes to us especially well recommended, and her success is a certainty. All children of suitable age, five or nearly so, are received. The aim of the kindergarten will be to prepare children for the first grade. Therefore it is of importance that they have this work.

The chemistry class has a membership of sixteen. This is the largest one entirely from this grade, in the history of the school. The tuition for the first term is being collected and will at least equal that of last term, and may be slightly more. Birmingham gets the largest tuition of any place anywhere near its size in the state. This is certainly a fine record. The teachers for the year are as follows: Prof. A. E. Bellia, superintendent.
