**SUSPECTED AT MUSKOGEE THAT THE THREE DEPUTIES WERE MURDERED**

**FOUND ON LAKE SHORE**

**Had Set Out Saturday Afternoon in Search of Illegal Fishermen—All Were Heavily Armed.**

The belief that Deputy State Game Warden Julius Salomonson, his brother, Martin Salomonson, and Deputy Sheriff J. C. Hazeltine were murdered has grown since the finding of the three bodies on the shores of White Lake, Michigan, last Saturday.

The spot where the bodies were found is about two miles from Muskegon, in the direction that the trio took on Saturday night, when they started out in search of contraband fish in Michigan waters. For weeks past threats had been continuously made against the three officers, who had interfered with the illegal income of fishermen.

All of Saturday afternoon Julius Salomonson was along the shores of White Lake in pursuit of illegal fishermen and, becoming fearful of continued threats, he ordered Whitehall and got a brother and Hazeltine to go with him.
