**Information and Gossip Furnished by Special Correspondent at Lansing.**  
Lansing—Since the grand jury investigation and the indictment of two members of the legislature for alleged graft there has been a very active movement in Lansing of legislative expenses. Some interesting figures, showing the amount of the last legislature, are furnished by the special correspondents. It is shown that the total expense for the fiscal year ending last June 1, it shows that the total expense of the legislature was \$18,528, of which only \$18,528 was the expense of the members. The remainder was for the pay of employees, fuel and incidental expenses, and the salaries of the senators, which totalled about one-third of the total expense. The report shows that while there are 62 senators there are 61 employees attached to the senate staff, and that while the salaries of the senators aggregated \$18,528, the salaries of the employees amounted to \$30,751. Senators received \$57 each, which was at the rate of three dollars per day for eight days of the week, plus the expense of travel. The report also shows that 100 members shall be allowed three dollars per day for the time actually in attendance when absent on account of sickness. There were 100 members and the members being paid \$61,502.20 and the members of the house \$5,935.55. The total for incidental expenses, including the cost of the printing of the laws, was \$164,102.20, of which \$76,000 was for the salaries of members. Members were paid for 179 days.
