AN ORDINANCE

Granting to the St. Clair Edison Company the right to establish, build, equip, maintain and operate a light and power plant in the Village of Birmingham, County of Oakland, State of Michigan.

The Village of Birmingham hereby ordains that the St. Clair Edison Company, its successors and assigns, shall have the right to locate, construct, maintain, operate, use, alter and repair overhead and underground lines, poles, towers, masts, guy wires, cross-arms, insulators, transformers, switches, meters, and other appurtenances for the purpose of distributing electric energy for lighting, heating, power, and other uses within the Village of Birmingham.

Sec. 3. All poles, masts, wires, pipes, conductors, guy wires, cross-arms, insulators, transformers, switches, meters, and other appurtenances shall be constructed in a safe, substantial and suitable manner.

Sec. 4. At least twenty-four hours before locating any street, highway, or other public space, the said corporation shall notify the Village of Birmingham in writing of the location of the same, and the object for which the same are to be used.

Sec. 5. Said corporation shall not at any time be subject to the Village Ordinance now in effect relating to the use of public streets, avenues, highways, or other public space, hereafter to be passed, in respect to the location of poles, masts, wires, pipes, conductors, guy wires, cross-arms, insulators, transformers, switches, meters, and other appurtenances.

Sec. 6. Said corporation shall save the Village of Birmingham harmless from any judgment that may be rendered against the village by reason of the negligence of the said corporation or the negligence of its agents, servants or employees.

Sec. 7. Said corporation shall save the Village of Birmingham harmless from any judgment that may be rendered against the village by reason of the negligence of the said corporation or the negligence of its agents, servants or employees.

Sec. 8. The Village of Birmingham, if it hereafter desires, may contract with any person, firm or corporation, for a system of electric street lighting, and the rights to use and operate the same shall be subject to the approval of the Village Council.

Sec. 9. In case the Village of Birmingham elects to enter into a contract for a system of street lighting, as provided for in the previous section, the Village Council may, at its discretion, cause the same to be installed, and may, at its discretion, cause the same to be maintained.

Sec. 10. The Village of Birmingham shall at all times have the right to use any of the streets, avenues, highways, or other public space, for the purpose of installing, maintaining, operating, using, altering or repairing any of the appurtenances mentioned in this ordinance.
