

BLUE RIBBON TALE OF TWO DOGS

Trotter, Octoo, Pacers, Auto, The Liar, The Eel and Others are in Fine Condition For the Races.

Michigan and Canadian horses promise to cut a material figure in this year's harness racing, starting with the grand circuit inaugurated at Detroit, July 27 to 31. Scott McLane, of Coldwater, is getting on famously with his pair of campaigners. The Trotter, Octoo, 2:10, has been a mile at the fair grounds in 2:10, which makes him formidable in the \$5,000 stake at Detroit, as well as in the other early closing events in which he is named.

Auto, 2:10, the pacing fall brother of Octoo, has been a mile in 2:10 and the last quarter at a two-minute gait, showing a return of the form which characterized his career in 1906.

The Canadian developed pacer, The Liar, 2:44, now being raced by Frank Carey, paced a mile in 2:30, the last quarter at the rate of 2:01. He is in the \$5,000 Chamber of Commerce stake at Detroit and all the rest of the slow pacing classes.

The Eel, a gray pacer owned in Canada and driven by Dan McKeown, is coming along splendidly and is to be considered on his mile in 2:55 last year.

Of Ketchikan, Alaska. This Gives Words of Praise For a Former Troy Boy, Friends Former.

On the Seattle last night came the official acceptance of the resignation of Deputy United States Marshall J. P. Campbell, ending the active career of an official who has served faithfully and steadily for 25 years. Mr. Campbell's resignation was sent in some weeks ago, but the action has been delayed, and the letter received this morning, finally accepting it was one of which any officer might well be proud. U. S. Marshall Shoop expressed the keenest regret at losing the services of an officer who has an unblemished record of so many years, stating that he accepted the resignation with regret because he had no choice in the matter, and wishing him utmost good fortune in his new home. Mr. Campbell became deputy sheriff in Hatley, Idaho, just 25 years ago, also serving as deputy U. S. Marshall in that place. It is a peculiar incident that two other well known citizens of Ketchikan were living in Hatley at that time—Dr. Figgins, who was practicing medicine, and H. Z. Burkhardt, who was operating a store. Mr. Campbell held the office of sheriff of Logan county, Idaho, for four years, and of Ada county for two years, having his headquarters at Boise, and was warden of the state penitentiary for four years. He entered the service in Alaska in 1901 at Sitka, serving there until transferred to Ketchikan in 1906, and is now leaving his post with the respect and honor of both officials and the general public. With Mrs. Campbell and their two sons, he will leave for Eugene, Oregon, in about three weeks, and will settle down there on property he has recently acquired, to enjoy a thoroughly well earned rest.
