Seattle, Wash., Oct. 29, 1909.

Dear Priend Rousseau:
I received your letter October

We are all unsually well and enjoying life. We have comfortable, modern homes, live happily, get good sal-aries and, if there are in Seattle any happier homes, I would like to find them—Charlie's, Hattle's and Susie's. I live with Susie most of the time, though Charlie and Hattle often come and take me to their homes, and I stay until I want to go back.


