THE Contents of a Supreme Court decision handed down by Justice Van Dyke, of the United States Supreme Court, are...

In an opinion written by Judge Walter H. Sanborn, of St. Paul, and concurring by Judges Van Dyke, Hook and Adams, with a special concurring opinion by Judge Hook, the eastern district circuit court for the United States circuit court for the district of Columbia, rendered an opinion declaring the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, an illegal combination operating in restraint of trade and ordered its dissolution.

The opinion of the court was filed simultaneously in St. Louis and in St. Paul.

In this decision the government of the United States was a sweeping victor over the Standard Oil company. The case will be appealed direct to the United States supreme court.

The decree of the court dissolving the Standard Oil trust becomes effective on January 1st, when no doubt a stay will be granted for the purpose of an appeal.
