In the death of Henry Wiseman, life prisoner at Marquette yesterday, there close the last chapter of one of the most remarkable stories of crime ever unfolded around Detroit.

"Not one, not even those responsible for its development, has adequate conception of the influence of the 'International' upon American live stock interests. As a practical educator it cannot be surpassed as a stimulus to trade, it has no equal; as a means of shaping policies and correcting ideals, its influence is supreme.

The first paper of the afternoon was given by Mrs. Alice Crawford. Subject, "Harriet Beecher Stowe, in which many very interesting events in the life of this noble woman" were brought out. Uncle Tom's Cabin was written under the most discouraging surroundings. The care of a large family, sick children, poor help, etc., but the work went on. It was published as a serial in a New York newspaper and she received \$300 for it.
