OBITUARY.

Mr. Fisher was 85 years old and was married four times, his widow, formerly Miss Mary Jenks, many years his junior, surviving him. His only child, Albert C. Fisher, who lives on the Fisher farm just west of this village, was the fruit of the first marriage, his mother's maiden name being Willis.

When Mr. Fisher came to Detroit from his birthplace in New Jersey in 1844 he had a small change, less than a dollar in value. By working at his mason's trade and practicing economy he saved enough to go into the contractor's business with his brother and continued therein for 16 years, afterwards going into the lumbering business at Saginaw, then in banking business at Detroit with David Preston and E. G. Booth for 18 years, when he retired, in 1881, from active business.

About five years ago Mr. Fisher was stricken with paralysis which rendered him practically helpless, and in May, 1907, Mrs. Fisher died and a baby girl with his consent. Subsequently Albert C. Fisher, the son, filed a petition in the probate court asking that a guardian be appointed for his father, although it was declared that there was no intention of making the child an heir of the estate. Mrs. Fisher declared that her husband's real estate holding brought him in \$20,000 a year and asked the court to allow her \$1,000 per month for her maintenance and that of her husband.

Last year she petitioned for an allowance of \$1,000 to take her to the seashore, which was allowed and this year she asked for another \$1,000 to take her south.

Mr. Fisher formerly owned the Wright, Kay & Co. corner, in the Opera House block, Detroit, and also the Majestic building opposite and numerous valuable tracts and parcels about the city, which are extremely valuable.
